NC State University Announces School Leader Scholarship Recipients: The Durham Principal Leadership Academy Fellows

The award winning, evidenced-based Northeast Leadership Academy is expanding to Durham, North Carolina. In Fall 2016, NC State University forged a partnership with Durham Public Schools through the Durham Principal Leadership Academy (DPLA). The founder of Northeast Leadership Academy and subsequent leadership academies, Dr. Bonnie Fusarelli, explains: "Each component of DPLA is anchored in research-based best practices in leadership preparation and is designed to meet the specific leadership needs of Durham Public Schools."



The North Carolina Alliance for School Leadership Development (NCASLD) Grant currently funds the program, including full scholarships for DPLA's newly admitted Fellows.

Durham Principal Leadership Academy
Applicants participated in Candidate
Assessment Day, a day-long experiential
assessment. The rigorous admissions
process identified DPLA Fellows who are
passionate, energetic, and effective educators
committed to improving the performance of all
students. Through DPLA, Fellows will earn a
NC school principal license and a Master of
School Administration degree. DPLA Fellows

receive a full scholarship, paid internships, conference travel, textbooks, and technology materials. Following graduation, Fellows will serve in high-need schools in Durham, North Carolina for at least three years, a post-graduation commitment.

Dr. Pat Ashley is currently the director of North Carolina State University's Educational Leadership Academy for Durham (Durham Principal Leadership Academy). Dr. Ashley has a passion for student success and is committed to ensuring high student achievement by building high-performing schools and districts. Her recent prior experience leading District and School Transformation for the North Carolina Department of Public Instruction focused on data-documented school and district turnaround. She oversaw the successful implementation of the NC Turnaround Initiative as well as NC's ambitious Turnaround effort for 12 districts and 123 schools as



part of a Race to the Top grant. In 2013, she received the NC Public School Forum Jay Robinson Leadership Award for exemplary leadership with a statewide impact. Before returning to her home state of NC in 2006, she was Assistant Superintendent for Instruction of Kentucky's Owensboro Public Schools— identified by Standard and Poor's as an "outperforming" Title I district where student achievement far exceeded predictive

variables. She began her career as a teacher before becoming a counselor and school psychologist. These experiences solidified her knowledge of how students learn. She was a middle school principal in an inner-city magnet school in Charlotte, NC; principal of a large comprehensive high school in State College, PA; and, after a family relocation to KY, she became the principal of an elementary school identified as low performing. Following a short period of great collaboration, this school became the highest achieving school in KY for multiple years based on statewide assessment data. Among multiple honors, the school was featured on the Today Show for educational innovation and selected as a National Blue Ribbon School. Considerable years as a principal in diverse settings developed Pat's deep understanding of the critical role a principal plays in a school success. Her undergraduate degree in history is from Duke University and her master's degree and doctorate are from NC State University. She studied in India on a Fulbright and is currently Teaching Assistant Professor at North Carolina State University.



Brenda D. Champion, Ed.D. was also recently hired to work with the new Fellows as well. Dr. Champion will serve as Executive Director of NC State's Leadership Academies. She will assist Dr. Bonnie Fusarelli and will oversee all four leadership academies – The Northeast Leadership Academy 2.0 (NELA 2.0), The Northeast Leadership Academy – District and School Transformation (NELA-DST), The Durham Principal Leadership Academy (DPLA), and the North Carolina Leadership Academy (NCLA). She earned her undergraduate degree in government from Cornell University in Ithaca, NY. Her studies as an undergraduate included study abroad in Strasbourg, France.

With two elementary education courses taken in the summer of 1986, her teaching career in NYC began that fall. After three years of teaching, feeling a desire to be a student again, she took a leave of absence for one year and received a Master's Degree in Education in Administration, Planning and Social Policy from Harvard University. Her love of learning compelled her to obtain a second Master's Degree of Science in Elementary School Science and Environmental Education from Brooklyn College. After which she held various positions at both the school and district level in NYC. Finally in 2004, she decided that she wanted to make an impact as an instructional leader and applied to the NYC Leadership Academy and was accepted as an Aspiring Principal. Upon completion of the program, she became the principal of a middle school with a large student body (1400) in Brooklyn where she remained for 8 years. During her tenure as principal the urge to study came once more. She earned her doctoral degree in Educational Leadership from the University of Pennsylvania. Understanding that change is inevitable and can present new challenges as well as opportunities, she joined NCDPI as a School Transformation Coach and has supported principals and their school communities in Halifax County.
